Visiting Professor, Organization, Information & Learning Sciences, Global & National Security Policy Institute, University of New Mexico

PHILIP HULTQUIST

Director, UNM's Global & National Security Policy Institute

Philip Hultquist researches international relations, deterrence, and strategy with current research focusing on two areas of US Indo-Pacific Strategy: the role of non-traditional partners (like India) and improving deterrence in the Taiwan Strait. His previous positions include Associate Professor of Strategic Studies for the US Army School of Advanced Military Studies (SAMS), Interim Director for the US Army's practitioner PhD program, and Research Fellow for the Modern War Institute at West Point. He holds a PhD in Political Science from the University of New Mexico (2013).



WILL ITOH

Ambassador, US Dept of State (retired) President, World Affairs Council of Albuquerque

Will Itoh is a Senior Advisor to McLarty Associates and Professor of the Practice in the Dept of Public Policy at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. During his career as a Foreign Service Officer Ambassador, Itoh served in the U.S. Embassy in London and as the U.S. Consul General to Western Australia in Perth. He was Deputy Executive Secretary of the Department of State, and Executive Secretary of the National Security Council at the White House 1993–1995. From 1995–1999 he served as U.S. Ambassador to the Kingdom of Thailand. He is a graduate of UNM and served in the U.S. Air Force as a Logistics officer. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.



ROBERT LITWAK

Research Professor, Elliott School of International Affairs, George Washington University

Robert Litwak has previously senior vice president and director of international security studies at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. Litwak is a consultant to the Los Alamos National Laboratory. He served on the National Security Council staff as director for nonproliferation. Litwak is author of Rogue States and U.S Foreign Policy, Outlier States, and, most recently, Tripolar Instability: Nuclear Competition Among the United States, Russia, and China.



AILEEN MARTY

Distinguished University Professor, Florida International University

Aileen M. Marty is a physician–scientist specializing in infectious diseases, CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and high-yield Explosives) preparedness, and global health security with > 45 years of experience. She advises U.S. national security agencies and the World Health Organization on biodefense, pandemic preparedness, and emerging infectious diseases. A founder of Florida International University's Florida Advanced Surgical Transport, she leads outbreak response and molecular diagnostics efforts and serves as Co-Editor-in-Chief of One Health (Elsevier).



EMILE NAKHLEH

Senior Intelligence Service Officer (retired), Central Intelligence Agency; Founding Director, GNSPI, UNM

Emile Nakhleh was a Senior Intelligence Service (SIS) officer and a founding Director of the Political Islam Strategic Analysis Program at the Central Intelligence Agency and the founding Director of the GNSPI at UNM. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Dr. Nakhleh is the author of A Necessary Engagement: Reinventing America's Relations with the Muslim World, Bahrain: Political Development in a Modernizing State, The Persian Gulf and American Policy, and The West Bank and Gaza: Toward the Making of a Palestinian State. He has written extensively on the Middle East, political Islam, radical Sunni ideologies, and terrorism. He is the former President of the World Affairs Council of Albuquerque.



JAY NEWTON-SMALL

Executive Editor & Vice President, Albuquerque Journal
