Nicaragua's Uprising: Perspectives from Nicaraguan Student-Activists

Join the LAII, SOLAS, and Fort Lewis College partners for a studentactivist panel presentation on the state of democracy in Nicaragua.

Democracy is currently in retreat. Roughly 2.5 billion people—or 1/3 of the world—live in a country where democracy is slipping away. The spread of authoritarianism in countries like Turkey, Hungary, Nicaragua, Venezuela, and the Philippines presents a troubling trend for all citizens of the world, including those who live in the four corners region. This event will present UNM and the broader Albuquerque community with an opportunity to discuss this timely issue alongside student activists from Nicaragua. The panel's speakers are currently living in exile due to persecution by Daniel Ortega, who has ruled their country since 2007. The panelists will speak about their



LESTHER ALEMÁN has been at the center of Nicaragua's student-led movement since the beginning of the April 19th uprising in 2018. During the initial negotiations between the government and civil society, Lesther famously stood up and told the president, Daniel Ortega, "We're here to negotiate your exit." Since negotiations with the government broke down in May 2018, Lester has been part of an awareness caravan in the United States and Latin America. At 20 years old, Lesther is reflective of the many young faces among Nicaragua's latest political movement. He currently lives in exile.
