Adrian Avila has over 10 years of experience working directly with diverse populations around the world. His prior work includes addressing child trauma in the non-incorporated colonies on the US-Mexico borderland, empowering the refugee population of New Mexico to be self-sufficient, and has served as a community health specialist in Dominican Republic on behalf of the United States

Peace Corps (PCDR). Furthermore, he helped found the Diversity and Inclusion Committee for PCDR and served as its Coordinator for a time. Currently, Adrian serves on the board of directors for the Dual Language Education of New Mexico non-profit organization, is the Chairman of the Sigma Chi Fraternity's Health, Safety, and Wellbeing committee, is an Analyst for the NM Legislature and has been working as an educator at Truman Middle School since 2018. Adrian obtained a B.A. in History

w/ a minor in International Management and a B.S. in Psychology with a minor in Statistics from UNM. He also has a Masters of Science in Management of Bioeconomy, Innovation, and Governance.



Chen-Lun "Jason" Chang serves as a Program Analyst with the International Programs Division on behalf of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) by providing access to NRCS's technical expertise to address responsible natural resource management; scientific and technical exchange; contributing to U.S. foreign policy which promotes economic stability, reduce poverty, and solve world food problems; and provide opportunities to broaden and increase the technical knowledge and professional capability of NRCS personnel. He represents the agency in planning foreign assistance programs with other agencies; and develops and maintains cooperative relationships with federal, state, and private agencies. Jason holds a M.A. degree in Sustainable International Development from the Heller School for Social Policy and Management in

Waltham, Massachusetts at Brandeis University and a B.A. degree in political science and a minor in business management from the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

After her service, Mayeen worked in public information and communications at the United Nations Department of Safety and Security. She also served as an Anti-Racism fellow with the Muslim Anti-Racism Collaborative and as a Citizen Historian with the 1947 Partition Archive, a nonprofit organization which documents eyewitness accounts from the partition of India. She now works for the Peace

Corps, serving as a Country Desk Officer for the Europe, Mediterranean, and Asia region. Currently, Mayeen is pursuing her international law degree from the University of London and hopes to one day prosecute war criminals at the International Court of Justice. She enjoys traveling, stargazing, collecting currency and postcards, studying geography, and meeting people from across the globe.



Michele Cruz served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Fiji from 2017-2020. A graduate of the University of New Mexico, she has 10 years of experience working in the public health sector of nonprofit organizations. She currently lives in Boston, Massachusetts, where she works for a behavioral health agency managing HIV prevention programming for at-risk youth in marginalized communities.
