Anjuli N. Fahlberg is an associate professor in the Department of Sociology at Tufts University and co-director of the Building Together Research Collective, based in Brazil, El Salvador, and Honduras. Her research employs a participatory action research (PAR) approach to study urban violence, politics, and social movements in Latin America. Her book, *Activism under Fire: The Politics of Non-Violence in Rio de Janeiro's Gang Territories* (2023, Oxford University Press) received several best book awards from the Brazilian Studies Association and the Human Rights Section of the International Studies Association. Her current project examines the impact of states of exception on urban violence and social resilience in El Salvador and Honduras.

Nilza Rogéria de Andrade Nunes is an associate professor in the Department of Social Work at the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro (PUC-Rio), Brazil. She is a social worker, holds a PhD in social work, and completed a postdoctoral fellowship in public health at the University of Brasília. Her academic work promotes dialogue among social work, public health, and participatory research, with an emphasis on the intersections of gender, race, territory, and health. She conducts long-term research and community outreach activities on the leadership of Black women in favelas and urban peripheries, investigating community leadership, solidarity networks, collective resistance, and the social determinants of health.



Siegrid Guillaumon Dechandt is a professor in the Department of Management at the University of Brasília. She earned her PhD from the Federal University of Bahia, with a dissertation nominated for the National CAPES Dissertation Award, and a bachelor's degree in management from the University of São Paulo, where she received the Ruy Leme Academic Excellence Award. Her current research focuses on systemic creativity and the public sector and sports management, with an emphasis on para-sport development. She coordinates outreach projects on sustainability and national parks in Brazil, early career internationalization, and studies in China. She is an accredited researcher at the Center for Advanced Studies in Government and Public Administration (CEAG-UnB).
